## Did you know....

City of Wooster continually maps and manages over 3,700 city trees.

Annually, the city plants between 150 and 200 trees on city properties.

The Public Properties Maintenance Division staff maintains the city's trees, downtown landscape beds, planters, hanging baskets, and thousands of parkland and forest trees owned by the city. This work continues year-round to keep our city beautiful and safe.

Since 1956, Urban Forestry assists two local service organizations, distributing over 675 dogwood and magnolia trees on Arbor Day to Wooster City Schools' children, grades 1 and 5, for planting at their residences.
